WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING IN THE EDGELEY AG. DEPARTMENT?



The fresh semester is in full swing and the Ag. 2.0 classroom has been busier than ever. The students as well as myself are excited for this upcoming semester and all that it holds! Each month I plan to send out a classroom newsletter highlighting what has been going on in each of the classes.

Ag. Processing

March has been a month full of dairy processing for the Ag. Processing students. Students experimented with the different cheeses, debated what kind of cheese was the best for grilled cheese and noodles. Students distinguished differences with different types of milks and the difference between processed and unprocessed milk. Students investigated yogurt, sour cream and cream cheese and what makes them different. They are just wrapping up the misfits of ag. processing - products such as rice, canola and flax and their purpose in Agrictulture.

Junior High Ag.

Mr. Young and I co-teach the junior high grade students. We have half of the 8th grade class for the 4th quarter. We have gone through some AET basics with these students and now they are diving into drafting. Students are learning how to scale drawing and make plans.

Vet Science

Vet Science has a lot to encounter this semester. Students have been experience hands-on labs for suturing, bandaging, examinations, restraints and birthing assistance.



Small Animal Care

This class has been busy learning about nutrition then rolling into grooming, care, and handling your pet. Students have practiced sutures, bandaging, restraints and examinations. Students have researched proper cages and housing for specific pets, as well as calculating different costs to own a pet.

Introduction to Agriculture

The 9th grade class is split between me and Mr. Young, so this semester I received a fresh group of 9th grade students. Students built a wooden trash can out in the shop using the different power tools - all did a remarkable job! Students have a brief unit over livestock evaluation and selection. We are now diving into what the students tell me is their 'favorite' unit - FOOD SCIENCE. Students have been introduced to food science terminology and just wrapped up a food safety murder investigation. We will moving onto dairy science, sensory and product development this next month.

Foundations of Ag.

Foundations of Ag. is co-taught by both me and Mr. Young. Students are still welding with Mr. Young. In my class, we have been divining into the agronomy unit, distinguishing differences in the equipment used, insect ID and will be shortly becoming experts at crop and weed ID. The sophomore class is also in charge of the FFA banquet - students have been busy finalizing details and will be making homemade KUCHEN for it! Our FFA Banquet is Sunday, April 11th at 5:30 PM

Richland 44 FFA is "Virtual" Unstoppable! By Tony Boehm

COVID certainly has changed the way the entire world operates, and national, state, and local FFA activities have also been effected. Through all of the limitations and lost opportunities, Richland 44 FFA has done everything it could to keep pushing forward and give its members every chance to remain active and grow as leaders.

The September 30th District Leadership event was dramatically altered as speaking events were recorded and submitted instead of being judged live. Richland 44 FFA members stepped up and still competed in each of the four speaking events. The normally in-person Novice Parliamentary Procedure event was cancelled, so Richland 44 hosted a statewide virtual Novice Parliamentary Procedure event on November 27 with six chapters and 13 teams competing. Richland teams placed 3rd and 5th.

When our best participated event of the year, the U of M-Crookston Ag/Natural Resources Activities Day, was cancelled, Richland 44 FFA again hosted a statewide virtual event. On February 5th, 382 FFA members from 34 ND FFA chapters participated in eight different FFA Career Development Events. Meats, Floriculture, Agronomy, Small Animal Care, Environmental/Natural Resources, Ag Mechanics, Nursery/Landscape, and Livestock were coordinated using Google Classroom. 25 members from Richland competed. Richland teams placed 1st and 2nd in ENR, 2nd in Small Animal Care, 3rd in Floriculture, and 1st in Nursery/Landscape.

Thirteen Richland 44 FFA members competed at various events during the NDSU Little International/Collegiate FFA events on February 12. Highlights included a 10th place individual in Hippology, 1st place team in ENR, and a 3rd place Small Animal Care team.

Richland 44 FFA members looked for one more virtual event and 11 students participated in the Southwest Minnesota State University virtual contest on Feb 25th. The Environmental/Natural Resources team placed 8th, while the Small Animal Care team placed 11th. Finally, for a more traditional FFA experience, members of the Agronomy team competed at live events in Lisbon, Oakes, and at the State Agronomy event in Minot.
